The Centennial History of the Pennsylvania Alpha Zeta Association

On August 4, 2006 the House Corporation turned 100 years of age. Formed in 1906 with the purpose of building what would become the Ranch, the Pennsylvania Alpha-Zeta Association has continuously overseen the financial and physical operation of the house since that time.

The Minutes of the Association provide a (somewhat dry) history of our Chapter. Particularly striking is the obvious dedication of the men who worked for years to build the House. Their commitment is truly something to emulate.

As Alumni we each have our own perceptions of ΣAE , and what has changed since our residence on East Beaver Avenue. Also interesting to note, is how much has not changed during the century of reporting. In 1926 the Board lamented: "Undergraduate drinking is excessive, particularly at Commencement". In 1946 the Actives (according to one Alum) had "failed to keep the House in good condition" (an oft repeated complaint). In 1968 the Board noted its perception of a diminution in the hospitality afforded Alums by the Actives. In a regulation that most of us would see as draconian, IFC currently restricts fraternities to a total of six "dated" functions per semester, each of which may only last a total of four hours. Of course, in 1956 women (university wide) had a curfew of 11 PM and fraternities needed a weekly grant of permission from the Dean of Students to even hold parties.

While we no longer use the BA in the manner that many of us experienced, and while we no longer have a Cook, the core values and principals of our Fraternity remain unchanged. What was for us Alums a positive experience that helped develop and define us as adults can and will be for our Actives.

One other thing that has remained immutable – the absolute need for Alumni involvement both financially and, more importantly, as active participants in our Fraternity. Many things have changed, but most really have not. We as Alums need to recognize those that have and both Actives and Alums must recognize those that have not and will not.


