#### Will the BA Soon Be Part of Ranch History?

Since the late '70s, the brotherhood has utilized the third floor (aka "the BA") of

# And We Call it *The Rancher* Because ... Truth and Speculation Behind a PA Alpha-Zeta Institution

Have you ever wondered about the history of *The Rancher*? Who started it? What was the purpose? How did it get its name? Here is a little history.

Alumni relations had fallen off the charts back in the mid '70s, but it soon became evident that we, the undergrad brothers, needed a way to communicate (ask for money) with our distinguished alumni brothers. Therefore, it was determined that in order to do so, we needed to establish a regularly published document that relayed news of the active brotherhood, as well as promoted memories of alumni brothers and shared their life stories. A newsletter was the answer!

As we set out to create and name this publication, I had a number of recommendations: *The SAE Record* (already taken), *The Beaver Ave. Gazette* (boring) and even *The Phi Alpha Rag* (are you kidding me!). It was not until one day on campus — at the Willard Building steps, as I recall — that I heard one of my brothers shout out to me, "I'll see you back at the ranch." I knew instantly that had we the newsletter's moniker, *The Rancher*. You see, most PSU fraternities refer to their residence as their house, but we had a Ranch; it was much cooler.

That first newsletter was literally a cutand-paste job, which in those days meant literally printing the text onto paper, cutting it out with a razor knife and pasting it onto a master board so that we could then take it to the printer and have hundreds of copies run through a printing press. It seems archaic by today's technology, but that was how you had to do it.

The first issue's text consisted of articles

written by the intramural chairman, something about the Phi Alpha Kegglers (I didn't even know bowling was an IM sport) and the social chairman raving about the latest Chi O social. And, of course, our academic chairman wrote a very short piece. It was a onepage, legal-sized document with no

pictures that went out to all alums for whom we had addresses ... which was not a lot. The original copies that I had kept have long been lost in various moves, so the initial publication is lost in the annals of time.

Recently, however, I was asked why we call our fraternity house "the Ranch" and, specifically, where the phrase "back at the Ranch" originated. If you Google that phrase, you will see that the phrase originated in the

silent movie era, which lasted until talkies became the new technology of the late 1920s. In that era of cinematography, film directors used segues — written text on fixed screens intended to inform the film audience of a

change from one scene's location to another. As westerns and cowboy movies were a common genre at that time, a segue was often used for a scene that took you from being out on the western plains back to the ranch house. For a few seconds, the phrase "Meanwhile, Back at the Ranch" would let the audience know that the scene was changing while the player piano kept pace in the background.

While we don't know exactly when our brotherhood started calling 200 East Beaver Ave. "the Ranch" (maybe somebody from earlier years can answer that

question), we do know that back when that beautiful graystone home was completed in 1921, the silent movie was the major form of entertainment. And maybe, just maybe, one of the first brothers to walk through those doors had just come back from the moving picture house in downtown State College, kicked his boots off in one of those big chairs in the newly completed Great Hall and proclaimed, "Boys, it's good to be back at the Ranch!"

#### **Are You Living the Code?**


As brothers of Sigma Alpha Epsilon at Penn State, we have certainly heard it before. In upholding the code of the True Gentleman,
